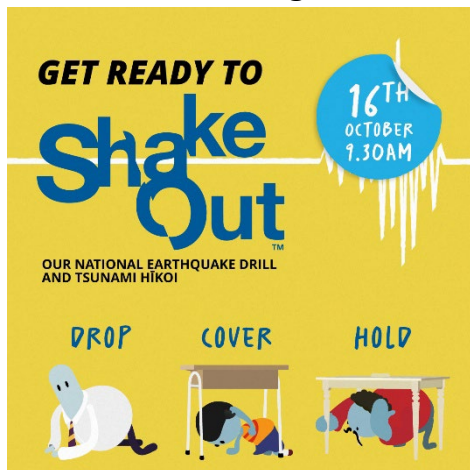
Kia ora, and welcome to our first quarterly newsletter!

ShakeOut reminder

ShakeOut, Aotearoa's national earthquake drill and tsunami hikoī, is on next week – Thursday 16 October, 9:30am. It's a great opportunity for your group and community to run a quick 'Drop, Cover, and Hold' drill and have a conversation about preparedness. [Sign up here](#).

Getting Good and Ready

QLDC Welcoming Communities and the Lakes Multicultural Collective teamed up with NZ Red Cross to run 'Good and Ready' emergency preparedness sessions in Queenstown and Wānaka last month. While these were open to all, there was a particular focus on supporting migrant communities, who may be less familiar with our local hazards and emergency systems. The sessions were really well received and more work is planned to continue raising awareness.

Prep talk: Small steps, stronger communities

Life's busy, and we're conscious that people may not have much spare time or cash to spend on emergency preparedness. But getting started doesn't have to be hard or expensive. Here are a few quick, free actions you can encourage people to do today – just 15 minutes now could save a lot of time and stress later!

Know your hazards:

- Check out [Emergency Management Otago's webpage](#) for a summary of Queenstown Lakes hazards.
- For more detail, view Otago Regional Council's new [natural hazard exposure map](#). It covers nine hazard types (floods, earthquakes, coastal, landslides, etc.) and estimates how many people, buildings, and critical facilities potentially lie in harm's way. It's a strategic tool (not a site-level risk assessment) designed to guide planning, resilience-building, and future investigations. [Read more](#).
- Snowmelt and unsettled weather can bring an increased risk of flooding in spring. [Find out more](#).

Stay informed:

- [Sign up to Otago Gets Ready](#) for official emergency text/email updates and advice from Emergency Management Otago, tailored to your neighbourhood. You can also help by privately listing any resources you have, like a 4WD, Starlink, or first aid training. If you have specific needs (such as health, mobility, or language support), you can include those too, so responders know how to assist you if needed.

Govt's new emergency management roadmap

The government has unveiled a five-year plan to modernise emergency response systems, improve coordination, and boost community resilience. [Read more](#).

Minister of Emergency Management visits Wānaka

Hon. Mark Mitchell, Minister for Emergency Management, recently visited Wānaka to meet with local emergency services and volunteers. Wānaka CRG representatives attended and received praise from the Minister on behalf of all CRGs across the district. He acknowledged the huge contribution volunteers make to local readiness and response, especially in supporting neighbours and connecting communities during emergencies. He also shared some insights into the upcoming Emergency Management Bill, highlighting that community groups will have a stronger, more formal role in the future Civil Defence and Emergency Management (CDEM) system.

Clued Up Kids learn emergency smarts

Earlier this year, more than 500 Year 6 students across Queenstown Lakes and Central Otago graduated from Emergency Management Otago's biggest ever *Clued Up Kids* programme, learning how to stay safe and respond in emergencies. [Read more](#).
